September Letter

Dear friends,

I am writing this the day after Alan and I hosted Afternoon Tea at the Rectory - and you can see some photos of the wonderful afternoon we had later in the magazine. We thoroughly enjoyed seeing everyone and chatting over sandwiches and cake, thank you so much for coming.

In September I am beginning another event taking place in the rectory – Midweek. Midweek will be a weekly short communion service at 11am in the Chapel at the rectory using informal liturgy. On the first Wednesday of every month, it will be followed by an informal lunch (soup and sandwiches), again at the rectory.

For those who work during the day, on the first Wednesday of every month, this short communion service will be repeated in the Chapel at 6:30 PM, this time followed by an informal supper (pizza). My aim is simply to encourage us to meet together with the Lord as part of our personal rhythm of prayer and worship, which is the

foundation of our fellowship and faith. It would be lovely to welcome you to the rectory for Midweek, so why not give it a try? September is the beginning of a new school year, and it has that new year feel as there is lots going on in Church Lawton this month.....

At our September Parochial Church Committee meeting, as well as the usual regular agenda items, we'll be thinking about our values as a PCC. These are important as they help us think about not only what we are doing as a church but the way we are doing them. Our values will compliment our Mission Statement Sharing the love of Jesus in our community.

Our Divine Relief Project continues to gather information with a visit from a heating specialist to help us understand our heating needs now and in the future and the best way to meet those need from both an economic and environmental viewpoint.

This month also sees the start of a trial period in which we will be

using different informal communion liturgies at our 10.45 service, such as Iona, Taize, Northumbrian instead of our Common Worship liturgy on the third Sunday of the month. We will then review things after a few months of this trial. If we don't like it, we will revert back to Common Worship on that Sunday. If we like it, then the PCC will consider making it part of our pattern of services, giving us a broader range of liturgies.

And last, but by no means least, looking towards the end of the month, on Saturday 28th we are holding our usual Macmillan Coffee Morning. Last year we raised a magnificent sum. This year it would be great to match or even exceed this total for such a worthwhile and important cause.

We do hope you will get involved with some or all of these events,

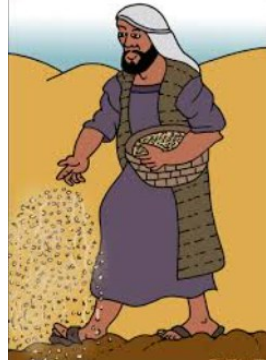

What's the Big Idea?

An Introduction to the Gospel of Matthew

This month we turn to the New Testament and look at Matthew, the first of the gospels. Although linked to Matthew the apostle, it is generally believed that the author used oral tradition, written fragments, eye-witness accounts, as well as common material in the other synoptic gospels (Mark and Luke).

Matthew, in writing for Jews, sets out to prove that Jesus is the true Messiah. He connects Jesus' birth, life death and resurrection with the Old Testament Scriptures. In fact, he quotes the Old Testament more than any other New Testament author. This is reflected in the opening genealogy which traces Jesus back to Abraham; in his use of the terms kingdom of heaven and Father in heaven, reflecting a Jewish reluctance to use God's name; and in the way he portrays Jesus as the Son of David.

The whole gospel is structured around five blocks of teaching (chapters 5-7; 10; 13; 18; 24-25). This fivefold division reflects the structure of the Pentateuch (the first five books of the Old Testament).

Matthew provides a comprehensive context by which we see all God's creation and salvation completed in Jesus, and all parts of our lives (work, family, friends and future) completed in Him. At the end of his gospel, Matthew records Jesus' commission to His disciples share this good news, promising to be with them:

'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to Me. Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely, I am with you always, to the very end of the age.' (28:18-20)

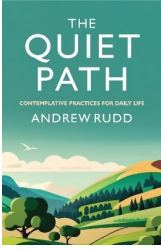

The Quiet Path – Contemplative practices for daily life
By Andrew Rudd, Canterbury Press, £12.99

The Quiet Path is a book for the walker, or the armchair traveller, the clear-sighted tourist, or the bewildered wanderer. Blending reflection and poetry, it shows how the simple practice of walking can become a quiet path of wonder, and how a brief pause in a busy day can turn into contemplation.

It explores how the ordinary practices of walking and noticing, recognising and writing can help us discover depth and spirituality in everything we encounter and find a deeper awareness of a Presence in all things.

This book is not about the big idea, the motorway, the A-road, the bypass. It's about snickets, byways, bridleways and gentle lines across the map. Every page is a signpost pointing down a quiet path, ready for you to take a walk through the landscape of the heart.

A sudden gust of wind took all who were at the ceremony by surprise. Hats were blown off and copies of the vicar's speech and other rubbish were scattered over the site.

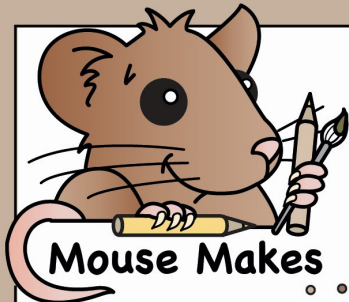
The Rector is on holiday this month. Local clergy will be celebrating with us all the Sundays that he is away.

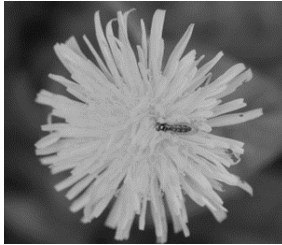

Recycling & Green Living Tips

Five tips for attracting bees to your garden



1. Mow less. Studies have found that lawns mowed every three weeks have two and half times more flowers than those mowed weekly. Dandelions and clover flourish, providing vital sources of pollen.

2. Plant bee-loved flowers. Viper's-bugloss, teasel and toadflax are all favourites for bees.

3. Mix it up. Plant a diverse range of flowers, vegetables, shrubs and trees for the biggest range of food sources for bees, and other insects.

4. Ditch pesticides. Find alternative ways to tackle 'pests'. Here's our top tips: <http://www.gardenorganic.org.uk/.../prevention-is-the-key...>

5. Add water. Bees love to visit ponds, and a bee bath - a shallow tray of water with stepping stones - will allow them to drink and bask.

Having a quick break? Here are seven ways to make it more sustainable

Wash your hands more wisely. When you give your hands a quick scrub before coffee or lunch, pay a bit more attention to your taps? Are they still running while you soap and lather? A running tap wastes about 6 litres of water per minute. So, switch the taps on for the initial soak and final rinse and turning them off while scrubbing could save 12 litres of water per day.

Read a library book

As well as being free to borrow, library books have long lives being read thousands of times by different readers reduces the need to print thousands of copies creating carbon emissions. Keep your local library open by using it.

Keep sustainability in mind on your coffee break

Only boil the water you need for your drink.

Drink from a reusable bottle or coffee cup

If you are out of home, take your reusable bottle or cup and if you must have a single-use item recycle it.

Opt for a meat-free meal

If you are buying food or eating out it might be cheaper to go meat free. Research suggests that eating one

less burger a week would reduce carbon emissions equivalent to taking your car off the road for 320 miles.

Have a crack at fixing a broken item

Try your hand at a repairing – there might be a community group that can help. Fixing something reduces consumption and saves cash.

Clear your inbox

How many mailing lists are you on? If they are bombarding you with e-mails that end up in the bin folder? It is time to unsubscribe. An e-mail uses less carbon than a paper letter but even a standard e-mail uses 4g of carbon emissions so sending 102 is equivalent to driving a mile in your car. If you attach an image the emissions go up to 50g per e-

Problems with glow sticks



Initially designed for military and civil security use for emergency

lighting; glow sticks have applications as varied as camping lights and night-fishing lures. You will also see them at birthday parties or brandished on nightclub dance floors and music festivals. But after the celebration, what do you do with these plastic wands? Are glow sticks recyclable or reusable? And how can you dispose of them when they stop glowing?

As celebratory as they are, glow sticks pose multiple problems for the environment:

- They're disposable, designed for single use.
- They're made of plastic.
- They're non-recyclable.
- They contain questionable chemicals.

Glow Sticks Create Waste

They tend to get dumped and strewn about the ground after events. Amazon lists more than 20,000 different products under the category "glow sticks." Party packs come with hundreds of flexible glow sticks that revellers can fashion into glowing necklaces, bracelets, headbands, and more. These disposable plastic tubes are single-use plastics — they can only be used once. So if you must use them, put them in a bag and then in the landfill bin. Do not just throw them on the ground.

Change your lightbulbs

Over its lifetime, an LED light bulb will use 75% less

power and cost £126 less than an incandescent bulb. So there is no better reason not to switch all your lighting to LED bulbs.
